Fire prevention ordinance going to supervisors

A fire prevention ordinance for the communities of west Calaveras is close to final consideration.


The Calaveras Consolidated Fire Protection District Board of Directors last week voted 7-0 to recommend approval of the ordinance by the Calaveras County Board of Supervisors.

The proposal could reach the Board of Supervisors as early as next week for adoption.

The necessity for such an ordinance was identified more than a decade ago after the 2004 Pattison Fire in west Calaveras that destroyed 17 homes in the Burson and Rancho Calaveras areas.

CalCo Fire serves the communities of Burson, Jenny Lind, Rancho Calaveras, Valley Springs and Wallace, an area of 163 square miles with more than 15,000 residents.

A major focus of the proposed ordinance is mitigating the build up of "fuel loads" such (See Page 2)

Heat wave in holiday weekend forecast

The Calaveras County Health Officer has issued a heat advisory as high temperatures have been forecast for the county in the coming days.

Temperatures of 100 degrees or more are forecasted from Saturday, Sept. 5, through Tuesday, Sept. 8. While heatrelated deaths and illnesses are preventable, more than 600 people in the United States are killed by extreme heat every year. The warning signs of heat illness include heavy sweating, cramps, headache, nausea or vomiting, tiredness, weakness, dizziness and fainting.
