Sheriff, board chair disagree over Newsom's mask order

Two of Calaveras County's top elected officials got into a verbal sparing match at Tuesday's Board of Supervisors meeting regarding the governor's orders to wear face masks.

Sheriff Rick DiBasilio addressed the board outlining his reasons for not arresting or citing people who do not wear masks while in public during the novel coronavirus outbreak. While four of the board members voiced appreciation to the sheriff for his stance "encouraging" the

wearing of masks when out in the public. Board Chair Merita Callaway criticized DiBasilio for not coming out and saving virus, but everyone needs to recognize the public "must" wear masks.

Gov. Gavin Newsom on June 18 issued state breaking its single-day record for positive virus cases on Wednesday with 12.807 new cases and 115 deaths. cases, surpassing New York.

The sheriff told the board he supports the county and its efforts to combat the constitutional rights in this matter.
